Moral March, Saturday, March 2nd

On Saturday March 2nd at 10:00am the Poor People's Campaign will gather for their moral march on Raleigh. After another year of devastating legislative attacks on poor people and low-wage workers by the NC General Assembly, it's time for North Carolinians from across the state to take back the mic from the extremists and tell our elected leaders that we refuse to do anything but go Forward Together, Not One Step Back. The people of North Carolina are suffering:

- Over 40% of the state are poor or low-income: over 4 million residents.
- Over 1 million North Carolinians still lack health insurance.
- Nearly 2 million North Carolinians earn less than a minimum living wage of \$15/hour, 37% of the workforce.
- Average household debt rose 6% in 2022 to an average of \$56,590 in North Carolina.
