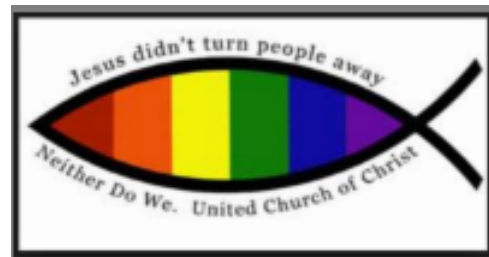

In partnership with PBS North Carolina and Working Films, Holy Covenant will host a screening of "American Coup," a film that shares the little-known story of a deadly race massacre and insurrection in North Carolina's largest city in 1898. Self-described white supremacists used intimidation and violence to destroy Black political and economic power and overthrow Wilmington's democratically elected, multi-racial government. Refreshments will be served prior to the 1:00 screening and discussion will start at 2:00.

This community event is a Racial Justice and Equity contribution to the Year of Wellness. At a time when the truths of our history are being erased, RJE offers this event as a corrective. We will also have the opportunity to process it with two guest speakers: Tom Hanchett, a local historian, will guide us through the historical conditions that made the coup possible and Justin Perry, a trauma-informed therapist, will facilitate discussion of the viewing experience.
