Modern Lesson Caroline Utz Our modern lesson for today comes from Rev. Angel Kyodo Williams, who is a Zen priest, Black queer activist, and contemplative teacher. Among her writing she says...

"Love and justice are not two. Without inner change, there can be no outer change, without collective change, no change matters. Liberation isn't a destination—it's a practice of presence. We must be willing to get free in our own bodies, even as we seek to dismantle the cages of systems. This is not about being perfect. It's about becoming whole. Every act of compassion is a strike against empire. Every breath you take in awareness is a jailbreak of the soul."

\*Christian Lesson Acts 16:16-34 (CEB) Pam Shimberg Please take a comfortable posture that supports your reading and worshiping... Our Christian Lesson for today comes from Acts 16:16-34, where Paul and Silas free a spirit-possessed girl whose been enslaved and are imprisoned...

One day, when we were on the way to the place for prayer, we met a slave woman. She had a spirit that enabled her to predict the future. She made a lot of money for her owners through fortune-telling. She began following Paul and us, shouting, "These people are servants of the Most High God! They are proclaiming a way of salvation to you!" She did this for many days.

This annoyed Paul so much that he finally turned and said to the spirit, "In the name of Jesus Christ, I command you to leave her!" It left her at that very moment.

Her owners realized that their hope for making money was gone. They grabbed Paul and Silas and dragged them before the officials in the city center. When her owners approached the legal authorities, they said, "These people are causing an uproar in our city. They are Jews who promote customs that we Romans can't accept or practice." The crowd joined in the attacks against Paul and Silas, so the authorities ordered that they be stripped of their clothes and beaten with a rod. When Paul and Silas had been severely beaten, the authorities threw them into prison and ordered the jailer to secure them with great care. When he received these instructions, he threw them into the innermost cell and secured their feet in stocks.

Around midnight Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God, and the other prisoners were listening to them. All at once there was such a violent earthquake that it shook the prison's foundations. The doors flew open and everyone's chains came loose. When the jailer awoke and saw the open doors of the prison, he thought the prisoners had escaped, so he drew his sword and was about to kill himself. But Paul shouted loudly, "Don't harm yourself! We're all here!"

The jailer called for some lights, rushed in, and fell trembling before Paul and Silas. He led them outside and asked, "Honorable masters, what must I do to be rescued?"

. . .

They replied, "Believe in the Lord Jesus, and you will be saved—you and your entire household." They spoke the Lord's word to him and everyone else in his house. Right then, in the middle of the night, the jailer welcomed them and washed their wounds. He and everyone in his household were immediately baptized. He brought them into his home and gave them a meal. He was overjoyed because he and everyone in his household had come to believe in God.

## THE MYSTIC SUPPER ALL ARE WELCOME AT CHRIST'S TABLE

Invitation Rev. Christopher Czarnecki

One: The Lord be with you.

Many: And also with you.

One: Lift up your hearts.

Many: We lift them up to the Lord.
One: Let us give thanks to the Lord.

Many: It is good to give our thanks and praise.

One: Come to this table, all who are hungry for hope. Come, not because

you must, but because you are welcome. Come, whether the song in your heart is one of praise or protest, whether you are free or still waiting to be liberated. This is Christ's table—not set for the worthy, but for the willing; not for the perfect, but for all who long for the God who loves them. Here, there are no gatekeepers. There are no purity tests. There is just bread for the journey, and a cup of courage for the road ahead. Jesus set this table with enough love to hold all

of who we are, and all that the world is aching to become.

## Words of Institution

We remember Jesus: not just as a man of peace, but as a prophet of justice. He healed on the Sabbath. He welcomed women to lead.

He touched what was considered unclean and blessed what had been discarded. He stood with the oppressed, dined with outcasts, and spoke truth to power even when it cost him everything.

On the night he was arrested, he gathered with his friends for a simple meal. And while they were eating, he took the bread, gave thanks, broke it, and shared it, saying:

"This is my body, broken for you. Take and eat."

Let this be a sign that God will always love you.

And after supper, he took the cup, gave thanks, and shared it, saying:

"This cup is the new covenant. Poured out for you and for many. Do this in remembrance of me."

Let this be a sign that God will always be with you.

So, we remember. We remember his life of courageous love and radical welcome. We remember the pain of the world he came to heal:

the weeping of children in Gaza, the cries for peace in Ukraine,

the desperation of refugees fleeing Sudan, the anguish in Myanmar.

We remember that Jesus' love is not only comforting but also confronting. It challenges injustice. It tears down walls. It shakes the foundations of this earth, like it did long ago.

## Sharing of the Elements

Holy Spirit, move through this bread and this cup, on all who will gather at this table. Make this meal a place of sacred resistance and holy rest. Nourish us with grace.

Strengthen us with courage. And when we rise from this table, may we do so ready, ready to sing with joy and march for justice, to break chains and build bridges, to love this world fiercely, just as Jesus did.

The bread of life, for you.

The cup of liberation, for you.

Take, eat, and remember: you are loved, just as you are.

God is with you, just where you are.

This table gives you what you need, so you can rise up and walk in the ways of Christ again.
