Prayer for Illumination (sung)

Take, O take me as I am; summon out what I shall be; Set your seal upon my heart and live in me. Our Scripture reading today is from Psalm 46, a psalm of gratitude for God's abiding presence. Throughout this psalm, we encounter the word "Selah." Though its exact meaning is uncertain, many believe it served as a cue to pause, to reflect and let the words of the psalmist sink in. As the text is read this morning, each time we come to "Selah," we too will take a moment to pause, and allow the truth of these words to rest upon our hearts.

God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble.

Therefore we will not fear, though the earth should change, though the mountains shake in the heart of the sea,

though its waters roar and foam,

though the mountains tremble with its tumult. Selah

There is a river whose streams make glad the city of God, the holy habitation of the Most High.

God is in the midst of the city; it shall not be moved; God will help it when the morning dawns.

The nations are in an uproar; the kingdoms totter; he utters his voice; the earth melts.

Spiritual Reflection Exercise

Take a moment to reflect quietly on your image. Breathe deeply and allow yourself to be fully present. When you feel ready, begin to write what comes to you. You might consider these guiding questions:

- What do you see?
- Why were you drawn to this image?
- What does it stir or awaken in you?
- How does it connect to how you understand God, Spirit, or Love at work in your life?
- When have you last felt what this image conveys?
- What might God be revealing to you through it today?

A Few Gentle Reminders

- This exercise may evoke strong feelings, including sadness, grief, or old memories. Allow what arises to come gently; be kind to yourself.
- There is no right or wrong way to do this. Simply let what wants to surface, surface.
- Your writing might be a story, a few scattered words, random thoughts, or a stream of consciousness all of it is holy!
- If you feel stuck or distracted, take a few slow breaths and return to your image.
- You do not have to write anything at all. Simply being present in stillness is itself a form of prayer.
